## Profile

### Overview

---

Florida State University is a public, fully accredited, coeducational institution, and is one of twelve institutions of the Florida State University System directed by the Florida Board of Governors. Located in Tallahassee, Florida's capital city, the university affords students and faculty opportunities for interaction with state and federal agencies for internships, research, and part-time employment, as well as a myriad of social, cultural, and recreational activities. The main campus is located on 485.7 acres in Tallahassee with other facilities owned in Leon, Bay, Collier, Franklin, Gadsden, and Sarasota counties. Sites are leased in various counties in Florida and other locations overseas.

With 17 colleges, students take courses of study leading to:

- Baccalaureate degrees: 196 fields in 101 degree programs
- Master's degrees: 216 fields in 104 degree programs
- Specialist degrees: 18 fields in 6 degree programs
- Doctoral degrees: 126 fields in 64 degree programs
- Professional degrees: 8 fields in 4 degree programs

The academic divisions are the Colleges of Applied Studies; Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication and Information; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education, Health, and Human Sciences; Engineering; Entrepreneurship; Fine Arts; Hospitality; Law; Medicine; Motion Picture Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Sciences and Public Policy; and Social Work.

82.0 percent of the students enrolled at the university attend full time. Undergraduates comprise 73.1 percent and graduate students 24.2 percent of the total enrollment of 43,701 students in the Fall of 2023 (2.7% are unclassified). The average age of all students is 22.5; of undergraduates, 20.6; and of graduate students, 30.1.

### Tallahassee/ Leon County Statistics

---

According to United States Census estimates, the population of Florida in 2023 was 22,610,726. In 2022, the population of Leon County was 297,369, and the population of Tallahassee was 201,731. Leon County ranks 22<sup>nd</sup> in population among counties in Florida, and Tallahassee is the 9<sup>th</sup> largest city. Leon County is the most educated county in Florida, with 49.9% of residents holding at least a Bachelor's degree.

### A Brief History of Florida State University

---

Florida State University was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851 and first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857. Its Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to co-educational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University. It has grown from an enrollment of 2,583 in 1946 to an enrollment of 43,701 in 2023.

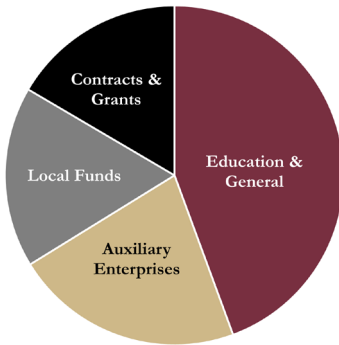

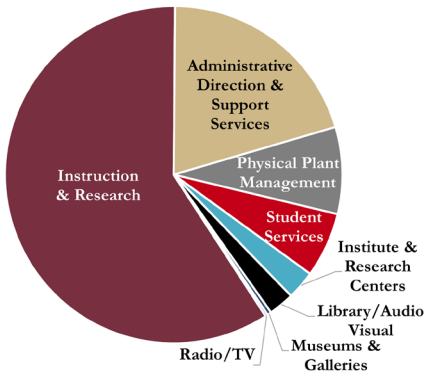

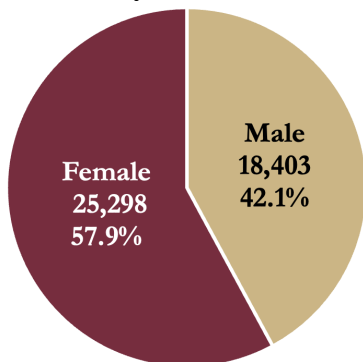

## Student Characteristics, Fall 2023

- Enrollment was 43,701: 31,933 (73.1%) undergraduates, 10,582 (24.2%) graduate/professional, 1,186 (2.7%) unclassified
- 78.8% of all students were Floridians; 91.9% were from the United States
- Seventeen Florida counties contributed over 500 students each: Leon, Broward, Miami-Dade, Hillsborough, Palm Beach, Orange, Pinellas, Duval, St. John's, Seminole, Bay, Sarasota, Brevard, Lee, Collier, Pasco, & Manatee
- Students hailed from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Twenty states contributed 100+ students each: Florida, Georgia, New York, New Jersey, North Carolina, Texas, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Virginia, Tennessee, Maryland, California, Ohio, Alabama, Michigan, Connecticut, South Carolina, Massachusetts, Colorado, & Missouri
- Twenty foreign countries contributed 40+ students: India, Panama, China, South Korea, Brazil, Venezuela, Canada, Nigeria, Bangladesh, Colombia, Iran, Japan, Jamaica, United Kingdom, Mexico, Pakistan, Spain, Vietnam, Haiti, & Italy
- Women accounted for 57.9% of total enrollment
- Minorities made up 37.4% of the student enrollment who reported ethnicity. Of those 16,097 students, 55.6% were Hispanic, 23.0% Black, 9.9% Asian, 0.3% American Indian/Native Alaskan, 0.2% Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, 11.0% Two or More Races
- International students comprise 6.5% of the 43,701 students enrolled in Fall 2023; 1.4% of students did not report ethnicity
- Average age of all students was 22.5; of undergraduates, 20.6; of graduates, 30.1; of unclassified students, 25.7
- Full-time students represented 82.0% of students
- The middle 50% high school GPA for the Summer/Fall 2023 first-time-in-college (FTIC) class was 4.2-4.5; middle 50% SAT scores, 1330-1410; middle 50% ACT composite scores, 29-32
- 74,038 applications were received for students applying for admission as FTIC students in Summer/Fall 2023; 18,793 were admitted and 5,890 enrolled
- In Fall 2023, there were 141 National Merit Scholars enrolled. Of these undergraduates, 46 were FTICs.

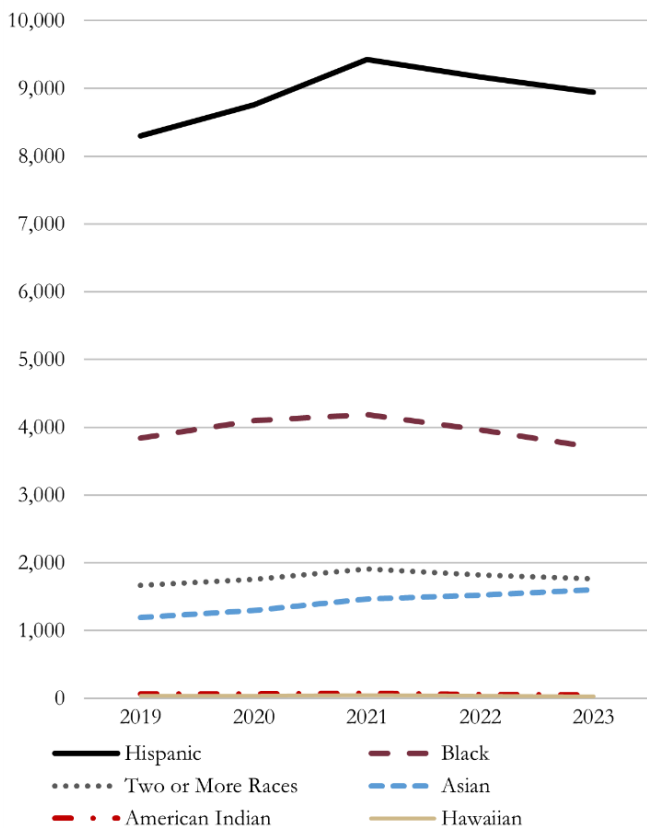

## Headcount Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity

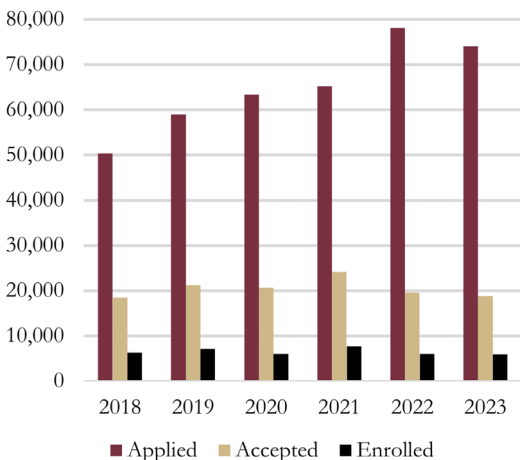

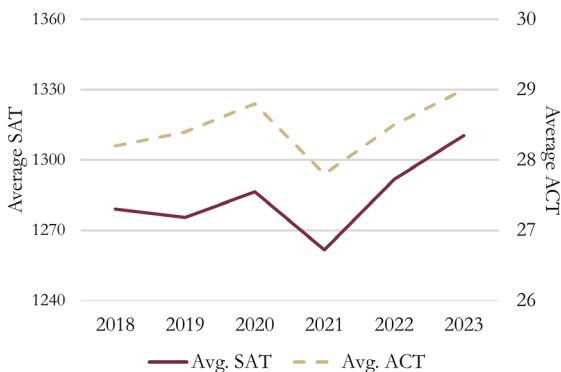

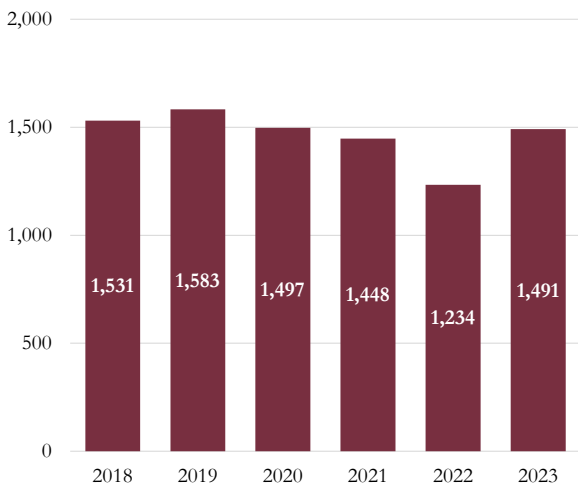

**Fall 2023 Headcount by Class**

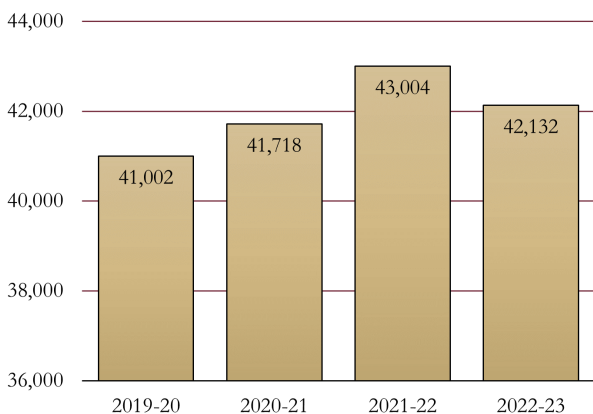

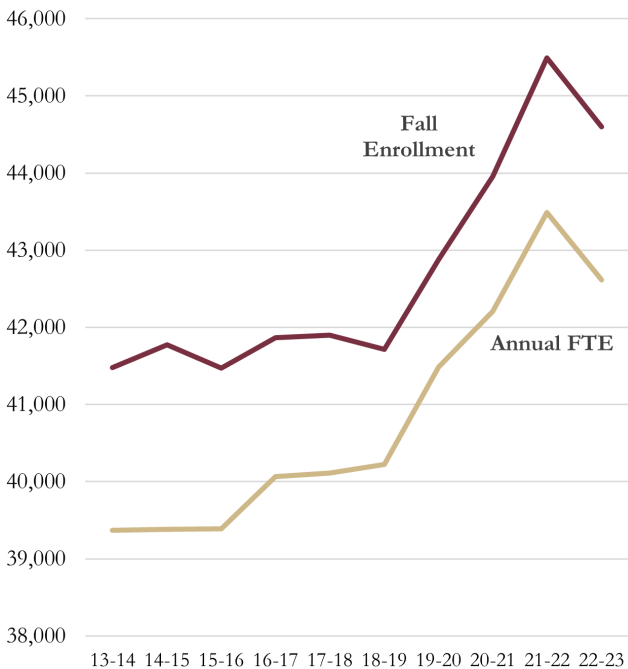

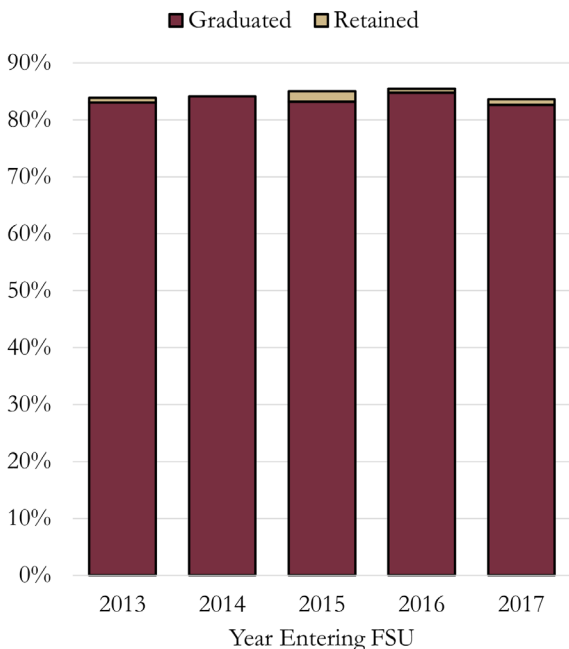

## University Libraries

University Libraries provide collections, resources, and services to enhance the learning, teaching, research, and service activities of the Florida State University. The Libraries' collections include 4.9 million titles, and the website offers access to 660 databases, and more than 219,732 electronic journals. Materials not available online or at the Libraries may be requested through interlibrary loan or the statewide UBorrow system, offering FSU faculty and students access to millions of books from 39 other state university and college libraries. The Library Express Delivery Service (LEDS) delivers daily.

University Libraries had over 1.6 million visitors last fiscal year 2022-23. This visitor count is approaching pre-pandemic levels. Typically, Strozier Library, FSU's largest library, is open 134 hours each week to provide around-the-clock research assistance and other services like free academic support throughout the day and late into the night. Students and faculty can choose learning spaces, from the Scholars Commons' quiet Reading Room to the buzz of the first floor Learning Commons. Library faculty offer classes and consultations to teach critical research and thinking skills. For distant learners and other off-campus library users, online research and other outreach services are available.

The FSU Libraries include the following: the Robert Manning Strozier Library, Paul A. M. Dirac Science Library, Mildred and Claude Pepper Library, the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering Library, and FSU Panama City – Florida Library and Learning Center. The following are designated dean-directed libraries: Warren Allen Music Library, College of Law Legal Research Center, College of Medicine Medical Library, and the John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art Library in Sarasota. International Programs study centers in London, Florence, Valencia, and Panama also provide library services and spaces.

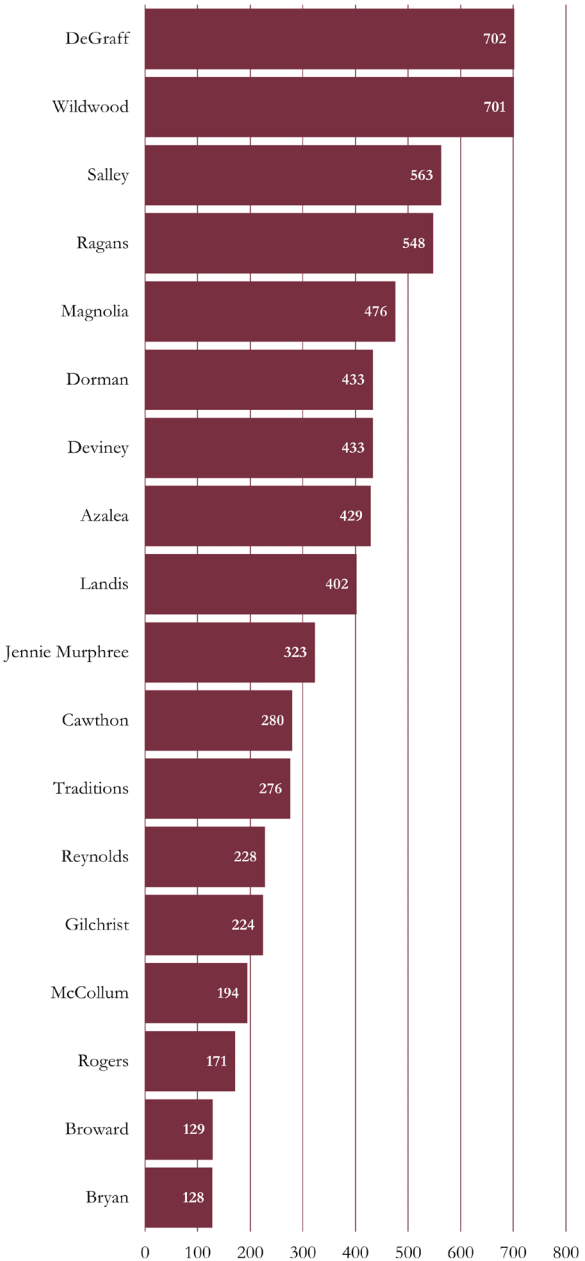
