Profile

Overview

Florida State University is a public, fully accredited, coeducational institution, and is one of twelve institutions of the Florida State University System directed by the Florida Board of Governors. Located in Tallahassee, Florida's capital city, the university affords students and faculty opportunities for interaction with state and federal agencies for internships, research, and part-time employment, as well as a myriad of social, cultural, and recreational activities. The main campus is located on 485.7 acres in Tallahassee with other facilities owned in Leon, Bay, Collier, Franklin, Gadsden, and Sarasota counties. Sites are leased in various counties in Florida and other locations overseas.

Across FSU's 17 colleges, students can pursue:

- Baccalaureate degrees: 194 active majors in 98 degree programs
- Master's degrees: 226 active majors in 102 degree programs
- Specialist degrees: 17 active majors in 6 degree programs
- Doctoral degrees: 129 active majors in 64 degree programs
- Professional degrees: 8 active majors in 4 degree programs

The academic divisions are the Colleges of Applied Studies; Arts and Sciences; Business; Communication and Information; Criminology and Criminal Justice; Education, Health, and Human Sciences (Anne Spencer Daves); Engineering; Entrepreneurship (Jim Moran); Fine Arts; Hospitality (Dedman); Law; Medicine; Motion Picture Arts; Music; Nursing; Social Sciences and Public Policy; and Social Work.

81.7 percent of enrolled students attend full time. Undergraduates comprise 73.0 percent and graduate students 24.2 percent of the total enrollment of 44,308 students in the Fall of 2024 (2.8% are unclassified). The average age of all students is 23.1; of undergraduates, 20.6; and of graduate students, 30.2.

Tallahassee/ Leon County Statistics

According to United States Census estimates, the population of Florida in 2024 was 23,372,215. In 2024, the population of Leon County was 300,488; ranking 23rd most populous among Florida counties. Tallahassee is the 9th most populous city in Florida, with 202,221 people in 2023. Leon County is tied for the most educated county in Florida, with 48.6% of residents holding at least a Bachelor's degree.

A Brief History of Florida State University

Florida State University was established as the Seminary West of the Suwannee by an act of the Florida Legislature in 1851 and first offered instruction at the postsecondary level in 1857. Its Tallahassee campus has been the site of an institution of higher education longer than any other site in the state. In 1905, the Buckman Act reorganized higher education in the state and designated the Tallahassee school as the Florida Female College. In 1909, it was renamed Florida State College for Women. In 1947, the school returned to co-educational status, and the name was changed to Florida State University. It has grown from an enrollment of 2,583 in 1946 to an enrollment of 44,308 in 2024.

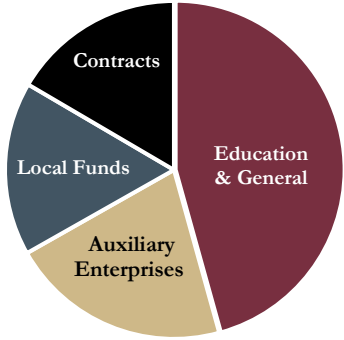

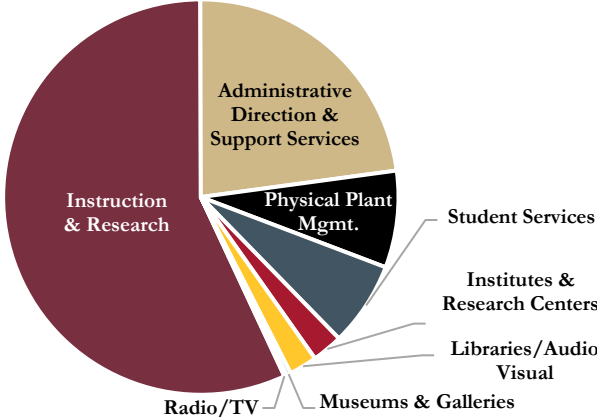

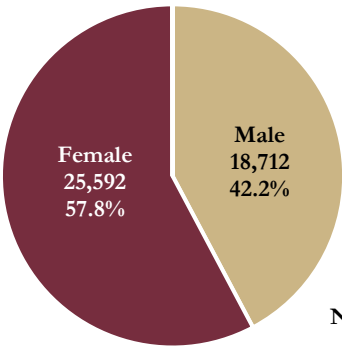
Student Characteristics, Fall 2024

- Enrollment was 44,308: 32,356 (73.0%) undergraduates, 10,711 (24.2%) graduate/professional, 1,241 (2.8%) unclassified
- 78.7% of all students were Floridians; 92.1% were from the United States
- Seventeen Florida counties contributed over 500 students each: Leon, Miami-Dade, Broward, Hillsborough, Palm Beach, Orange, Duval, Pinellas, St. John’s, Bay, Seminole, Brevard, Sarasota, Lee, Pasco, Collier, & Manatee
- Students hailed from all 50 states and the District of Columbia. Twenty-one states contributed 100+ students each: Florida, Georgia, New Jersey, New York, Texas, Illinois, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Virginia, Tennessee, Maryland, California, Ohio, Alabama, South Carolina, Colorado, Massachusetts, Michigan, Connecticut, Missouri, & Louisiana
- Twenty foreign countries contributed 40+ students: India, Panama, China, South Korea, Brazil, Venezuela, Bangladesh, Nigeria, Canada, Japan, Colombia, Iran, United Kingdom, Vietnam, Jamaica, Ghana, Mexico, Italy, Cuba, & Pakistan
- Women accounted for 57.8% of total enrollment
- Racial minorities made up 38.0% of the student enrollment who reported ethnicity. Of those 16,593 students, 55.8% were Hispanic, 22.5% Black, 10.1% Asian, 0.3% American Indian/Native Alaskan, 0.1% Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, 11.2% Two or More Races
- International students comprised 6.3% of the 44,308 students enrolled in Fall 2024; 1.6% of students did not report ethnicity
- Average age of all students was 23.1; of undergraduates, 20.6; of graduates, 30.2; of unclassified students, 26.0
- Full-time students represented 81.7% of students
- The middle 50% high school GPA for the Summer/Fall 2024 first-time-in-college (FTIC) class was 4.1-4.5; middle 50% SAT scores, 1350-1430; middle 50% ACT composite scores, 30-32
- 78,272 applications were received for students applying for admission as FTIC students in Summer/Fall 2024; 18,954 were admitted and 5,855 enrolled
- In Fall 2024, there were 150 National Merit Scholars enrolled. Of these undergraduates, 49 were FTICs.

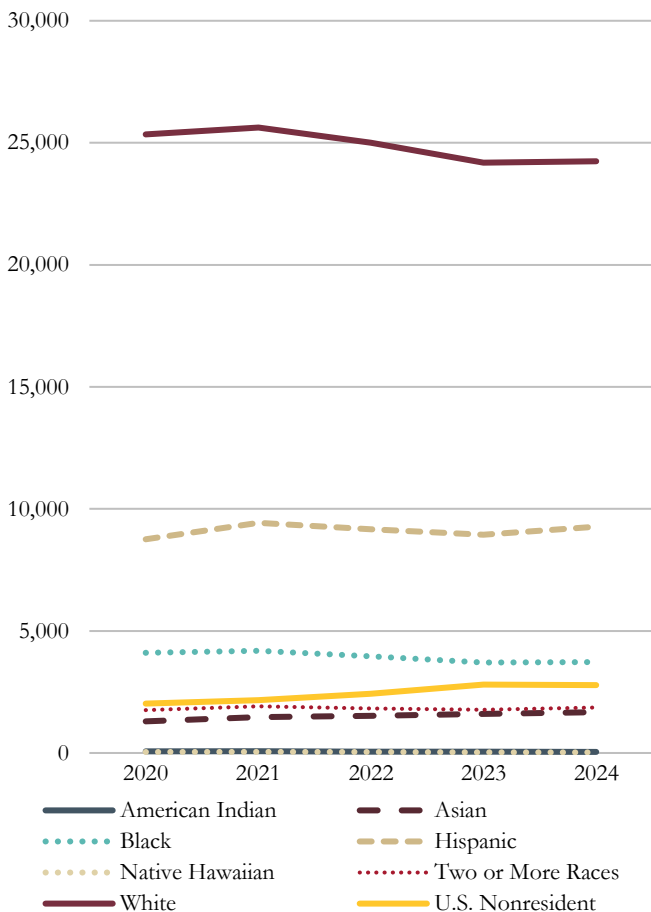

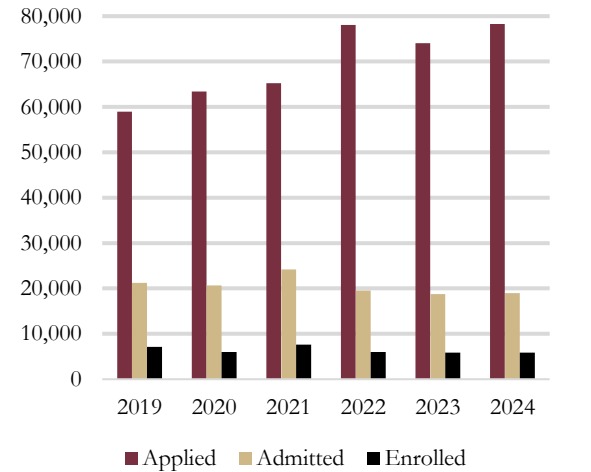
Headcount Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity



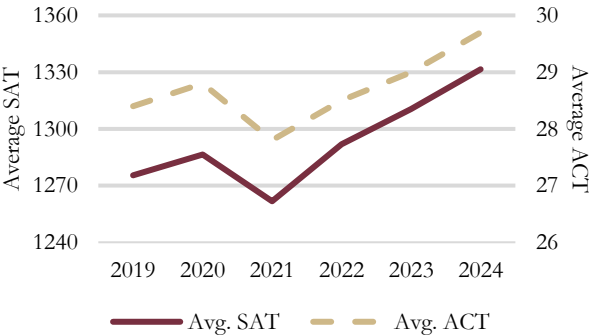

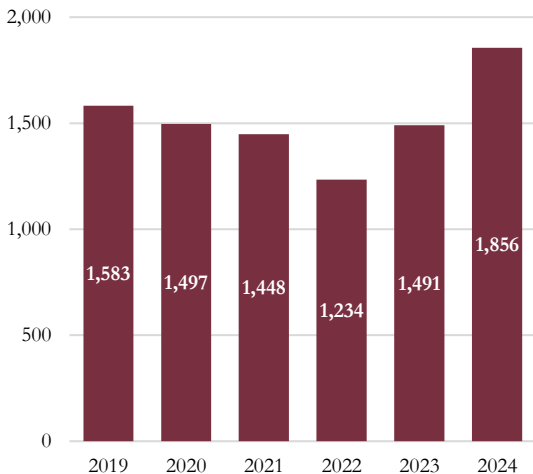

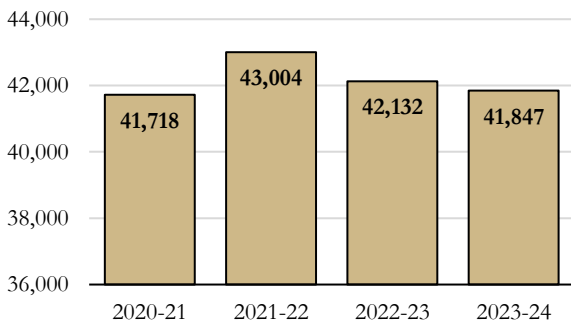

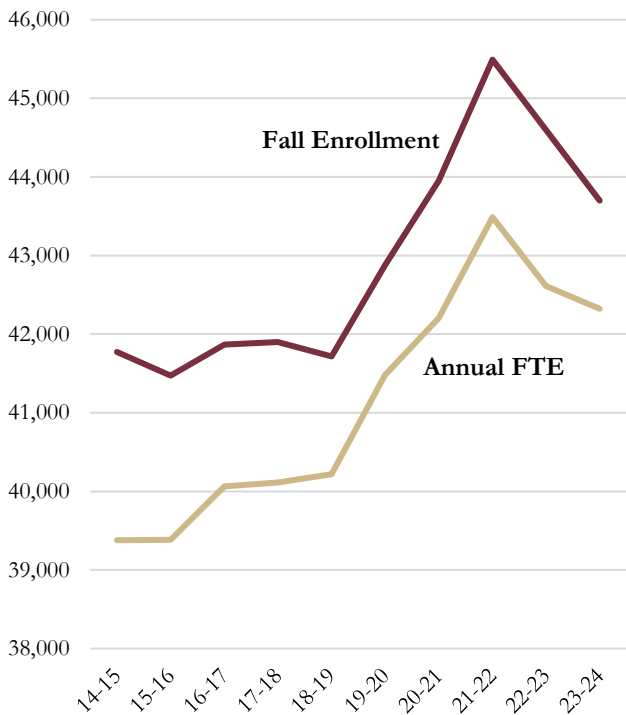

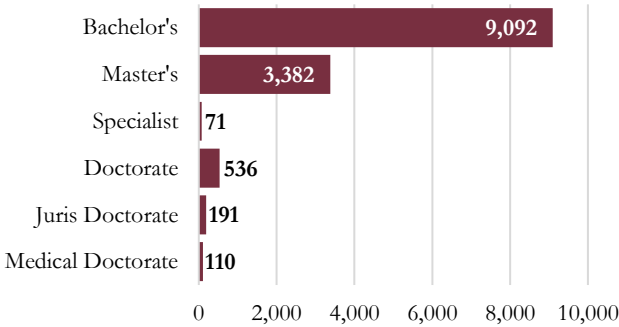

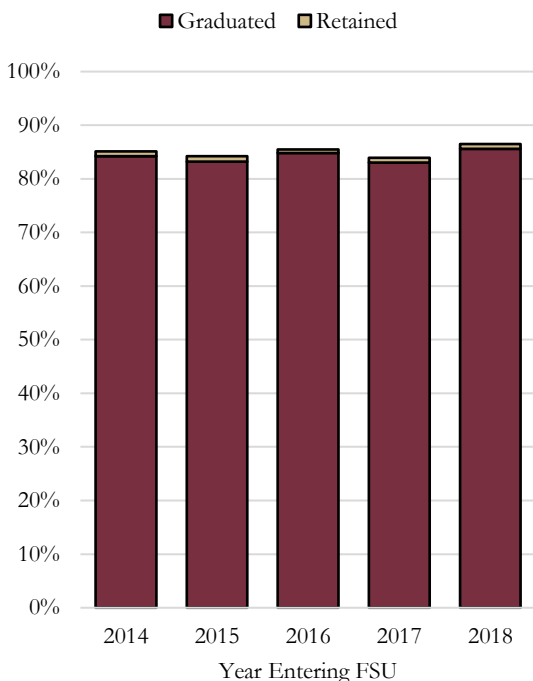

University Libraries

University Libraries provide collections, resources, and services to enhance the learning, teaching, research, and service activities of the Florida State University. The Libraries' collections include 6.1 million titles, and the website offers access to 753 databases, and more than 217,765 electronic journals. Materials not available online or at the Libraries may be requested through interlibrary loan or the statewide UBorrow system, offering FSU faculty and students access to millions of books from 39 other state university and college libraries. The Library Express Delivery Service (LEDS) delivers daily.

University Libraries had over 1 million visitors last fiscal year 2023-24. This visitor count is approaching pre-pandemic levels. Typically, Strozier Library, FSU's largest library, is open 140 hours each week to provide around-the-clock research assistance and other services like free academic support throughout the day and late into the night. Students and faculty can choose learning spaces, from the Scholars Commons' quiet Reading Room to the buzz of the first floor Learning Commons. Library faculty offer classes and consultations to teach critical research and thinking skills. For distant learners and other off-campus library users, online research and other outreach services are available.

The FSU Libraries include the following: the Robert Manning Strozier Library, Paul A. M. Dirac Science Library, Mildred and Claude Pepper Library, the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering Library, and FSU Panama City – Florida Library and Learning Center. The following are designated dean-directed libraries: Warren Allen Music Library, College of Law Legal Research Center, College of Medicine Medical Library, and the John & Mable Ringling Museum of Art Library in Sarasota. International Programs study centers in London, Florence, Valencia, and Panama also provide library services and spaces.

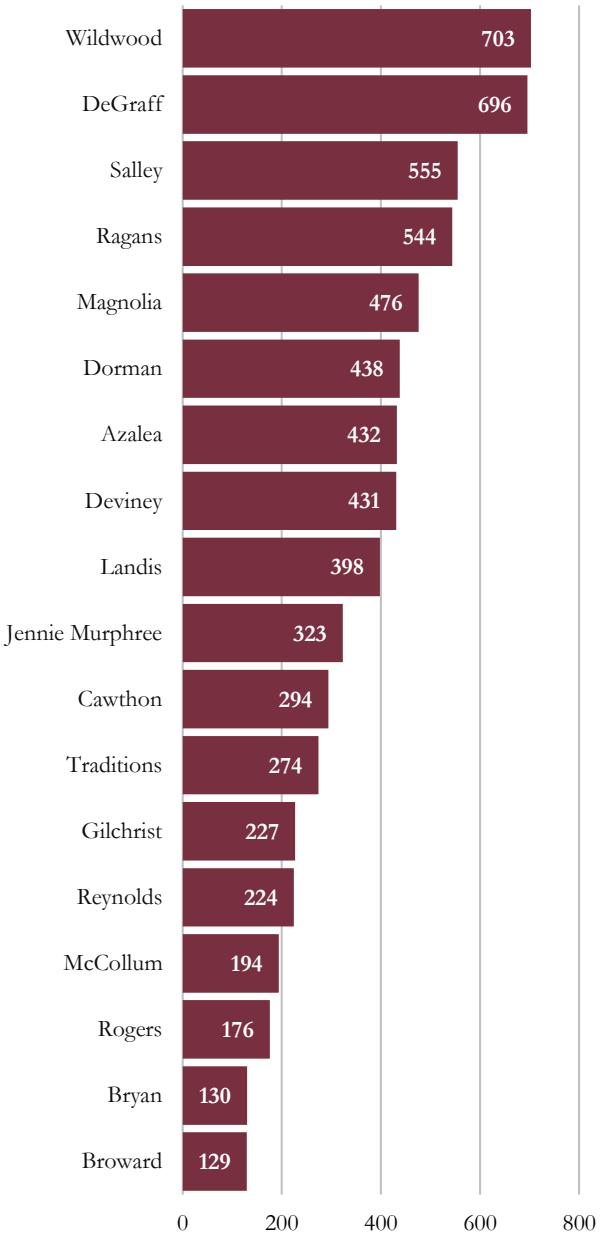
International Programs
